#### **Extended Hallowe'en Half-term Break**

On Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> October, the NI Executive announced that schools would close from Monday 19<sup>th</sup> October. This was unexpected as the Minister had continually said schools would remain open. It was yesterday afternoon before we were clear about the details of this closure. We now have the details:

Education settings will be closed to all pupils during these two weeks including for vulnerable children and children of key workers.

Schools and other settings will reopen on Monday, 2 November;

As this is an extension of the half-term break, it is not intended to be used for remote learning. This is a holiday; there will be NO remote learning;

During the week beginning 19 October direct payments will be made to pupils in receipt of Free School Meals.

### **Re-opening of Schools - Pupils' Feelings**

A short survey was carried out with the children yesterday, to find out their thoughts on the new routines in place. A quick analysis shows that the vast majority are happy back at school and feel safe. They are hugely accepting of our new routines and understand why we are doing them. Like the staff they can see that some things are better now, e.g playtimes, with classes having fun together rather than all mixed together. They do miss having the whole playground and a bigger choice at dinner. Some of them miss assembly but most like going directly to their classroom.

We will continue to reassure them in school, of the key things we can do to prevent it - social distancing, hand washing and Catch it, Bin it,
